i. Cedar Hill Roundtable

- On April 6th, the Committee on Health held a roundtable titled the “Cedar Hill Regional Medical Center Operations, Compliance, and Community Impact.”
- The roundtable consisted of testimony from the Department of Health Care Finance, with support from DC Health, the public, as well as hospital representatives.

ii. DC Health Fiscal Year 2027 Budget Oversight

iii. Prenatal and Postpartum Remote Patient Monitoring Clarification Amendment Act

- On September 16, Councilmember Henderson introduced the Prenatal and Postpartum Remote Patient Monitoring Clarification Amendment Act of 2025 (B26-0356).
- This legislation would cover and reimburse remote patient monitoring of specific health care services and expenses for pregnant patients. The

Medical Debt Mitigation Amendment Act</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• On October 20th, Councilmember Henderson introduced the Medical Debt Mitigation Amendment Act of 2025 (B26-0438).• This legislation aims to prevent and mitigate the burden of unpaid medical debt bills on District families, while increasing transparency in medical billing and ensuring fair debt collection. The high-level summary of the bill would be to strengthen large health care facilities financial assistance policies, create protections to mitigate the burden of medical debt, update medical debt collection practices, and establish legal enforcement and oversight.• This bill was referred to the Committee on Health and received a hearing on December 15th. DC Health testified during this hearing and expressed support for the intent of the legislation, emphasizing the public health impacts of medical debt and urging clarifications to ensure consistent implementation, alignment with existing healthcare and Medicaid policies, appropriate facility scope, and protections that reduce financial harm while maintaining the sustainability of the District’s healthcare system. <p>OS-26-04-05</p> <p>ALL</p>	<p><u>DC PRESCRIPTION DRUG MONITORING PROGRAM</u></p> <p>Board Action: The executive director for the Board of Pharmacy presented on the District of Columbia Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (DC PDMP), including its purpose, enrollment requirements, and guidance on registration and account access for licensees.</p>	

	<p>Background: The District of Columbia Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (DC PDMP) is an electronic database that monitors the dispensing of Schedule II-V controlled substances. The database supports safe prescribing practices and provides dispensing data to help prevent the misuse and diversion of controlled substances. The PDMP aims to improve the District’s ability to identify and reduce diversion of prescription drugs in an efficient manner without impeding appropriate medical use.</p> <p>In the District of Columbia, licensees are required to enroll with PDMP within 90 days of initial licensure. The program allows authorized users to register review a patient’s prescription history in accordance with prescribing and dispensing practices. Compliance with PDMP laws and regulations, including appropriate use of the system, is expected as part of professional practice. This presentation is intended to increase awareness of DC PDMP and to inform both providers and dispensers about the importance of the program, as well as how to register for and utilize the system.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dr. Lowe provided a brief overview of the PDMP requirements and explained how the program is designed to protect the public through cross-state data sharing and enhanced monitoring of controlled substance prescribing. She also noted that the PDMP will offer an in-depth training session in May 2026, which will include tailored guidance for all licensees. Additional discussion centered on opportunities to streamline the PDMP process to better support licensees in their clinical workflows, reduce administrative burden, and improve timely access to patient prescribing histories. <p>OS-26-04-06</p> <p>ALL</p>	<p><u>ETHICS FOR PUBLIC PROTECTION – EBAS OVERVIEW</u></p> <p>Board Action: The Board received a presentation on the Ethics and Boundaries Assessment Services (EBAS) and considered its potential use in disciplinary and remediation matters.</p> <p>Background: The Ethics and Boundaries Assessment Services (EBAS) is a scenario-based assessment tool designed to assist regulatory boards in evaluating a licensee’s ethical reasoning and professional judgment</p>	

	<p>following a violation. The assessment uses real-world case scenarios and written responses to measure a licensee’s understanding of ethical issues, consequences, and responsibilities, including impacts on public protection.</p> <p>This presentation will provide additional information on how EBAS provides an objective, third-party evaluation with standardized scoring, helping boards assess a licensee’s insight, accountability, and readiness for continued or reinstated practice. It is commonly used as part of disciplinary and remediation processes to support informed and consistent decision-making.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mr. Guye provided a brief overview of EBAS and explained that the assessment includes more than 1,000 scenario-based questions used across 41 states. He noted that the testing center utilizes Prometric for secure administration and standardized scoring, ensuring that no external factors influence the evaluation of ethical decision-making. EBAS is designed to objectively assess a licensee’s professional judgment, insight, and understanding of ethical responsibilities. Mr. Guy also emphasized that the cost of the EBAS assessment is the responsibility of the licensee, not the Board. He added that regulatory boards use EBAS results to support disciplinary decisions, remediation plans, and determinations regarding a licensee’s readiness to return to safe practice. The tool promotes fairness and consistency by providing a third-party, evidence-based assessment of a licensee’s ethical reasoning.
