White introduced the <i>ART Options for Youth Amendment Act of 2023</i> (B25-0500) on September 26, 2023. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ This bill amends the <i>Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect Act of 1977</i> with the goal of expanding 	

therapy options for children under the care of CFSA. It proposes the inclusion of alternative therapies including art therapy, music therapy, drama therapy, dance or movement therapy, and narrative therapy to facilitate opportunities for youth to express their experiences non-verbally and physically.

- A hearing is scheduled for December 6th

Behavioral Analyst Licensure Amendment Act of 2023:

- Councilmember Henderson, alongside Councilmembers T. White, Parker, R. White, and Frumin introduced the *Behavioral Analyst Licensure Amendment Act of 2023* ([B25-0566](#)) on November 6, 2023.
 - This bill establishes the profession of Behavior Analysts (BAs) as a licensed healthcare profession. This bill would place the profession under the oversight of the DC Health Board of Professional Counseling, aiming to enhance the professionalism of the field and expand the scope of practice for BAs, ultimately enabling them to address a broader range of behavioral and mental health challenges.

- A hearing is scheduled for December 7th

Health Occupations Revision Act (HORA) Update:

- DC Health worked on a significant revision of the HORA. This would be the first significant revision in seventeen years.
- The revised HORA received Mayoral approval, has been introduced in the Council as the *Health Occupations Revision General Amendment Act of 2023* ([B25-0545](#)), and referred to the Committee on Health on November 7th.
- A hearing is scheduled for December 7th

Health Professional Compact Bills:

- Councilmember Gray has introduced bills that would have the District join two health professional licensing compacts:
 - The *Counseling Compact Approval Act of 2023* ([B25-0287](#)) would have the District join the Counseling Compact and applies to Licensed Professional Counselors (LPCs).
- A hearing for the Occupational Therapy and Counseling

Compacts is scheduled for December 7th

Council Approved Legislation:

DC Health Director Appointment:

- Acting Director Bennett’s nomination has officially been approved as of November 7th

Pathways to Behavioral Health Degrees Act of 2023:

- Councilmember Robert White has reintroduced the *Pathways to Behavioral Health Degrees Act of 2023* ([B25-0055](#)), which would establish the Behavioral Health and Human Services Scholarship Program administered by UDC for students with bachelor’s degrees seeking to obtain an accredited master’s degree required for licensure by the Board of Social Work or the Board of Professional Counseling.
 - The scholarship funds will pay for UDC tuition, academic costs such as books and supplies, a monthly stipend toward living expenses and transportation, and fees associated with obtaining a license for a behavioral health occupation in the District. Both District residents and employees are eligible for the program.
 - Once a participant completes their master’s program and obtains licensure, they are required to work in a behavioral health occupation at a District local education agency, government agency, or health care provider organization for at least two years.
- Funding for this legislation was added into the proposed FY 2024 budget (\$1.2 million).
- The bill passed it's final reading on November 7th and is awaiting Mayoral approval.

Health Professional Licensing Boards Residency Requirement Amendment Act of 2023:

- Councilmembers Henderson and Parker introduced the *Health Professional Licensing Boards Residency Requirement Amendment Act of 2023* ([B25-0312](#)) on June 2, 2023.
 - This legislation permits non-District residents to serve on health professional licensing boards.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ There are restrictions, including that the Board Chair and Consumer Members are still required to be District residents and no more than 50% of the Board could be made up of non-District residents. • The bill passed it's final reading on November 7th and is awaiting Mayoral approval. 	
OS-1127-08	<p><u>Request from Adele Nater</u></p> <p><u>Board Action:</u> Board to review and discuss comments from Stakeholders.</p> <p><u>Background:</u> Ms. Natter on behalf of the Greater Washington Society has submitted a request for the Board to accept group supervision towards individual hours for clinical licensure. The DC Board's policy has been group supervision are counted towards general supervision hours. The ASWB Model Law recommends that fifty percent of the required individual supervision hours towards clinical licensure can be completed via group supervision and the group supervision may contain no more than 6 supervisees. The Board has developed a proposed statement on group supervision and would like the public to review and comment.</p>

OS-1127-10	<p><u>Ethical Concerns with DC Sexual Assault Victim’s Rights Amendment Act of 2019</u></p> <p><u>Board Action:</u> Discuss the potential impact the law will have on licensees.</p> <p><u>Background:</u> The Board received an email from Ms. Sherrod regarding the DC law on Teen advocates. The DC Sexual Assault Victims’ Rights Amendment Act of 2019 included the right to an advocate for 13 to 17-year-old youth in DC who have experienced sexual assault. For youth in this age range who were specifically impacted by peer-on-peer or stranger assault, the right to an advocate comes with an exemption to mandated reporting. A licensee would like the Board’s guidance since it had potential ethical implications on social workers.</p>	
OS-1127-11	<p><u>Endorsement Requirements/Reciprocity Pathway</u></p> <p><u>Pending:</u> Boards contact with the states of VA and MD to pursue reciprocity licensure pathways.</p> <p><u>Background:</u> In Attempt to provide easier pathways to licensure we are requesting each board to discuss and evaluate the following possibilities: Endorsement requirements. ASWB Model Act Section 308. Qualifications for Licensure by Endorsement. (a) To obtain a license by endorsement at the equivalent designation and subject to Article IV of this</p>	

	<p>Act, an applicant currently licensed as a social worker in another jurisdiction must provide evidence satisfactory to the Board, subject to Article III, Section 311, that the applicant: (1) Has submitted a written application and paid the fee as specified by the Board; and (2) Has presented to the Board proof of an active social work license in good standing.</p> <p>The Board has voted to pursue reciprocity licensure pathways with the states of VA and MD. The Board voted not to make any changes to the current endorsement checklist.</p>
