DC BOARD OF NURSING REGISTERD NURSES

The District of Columbia's Board of Nursing (DC BON), supported by DC Health's Health Systems and Preparedness Administration (HSPA), licenses all registered nurses. To collect standard information across all licensing boards (e.g. demographics, workforce capacity, access to care, special topics) HSPA and the Community Health Administration (CHA) partnered to develop a licensure survey, which is now administered to all renewal applicants during the Board's biennial licensure renewal process.

The DC Primary Care Office (PCO) developed this fact sheet based on its analysis of 2024 DC BON Licensure Survey data. Within, information regarding total licensed providers reflects all board-licensed providers with an active license status as of August 15, 2024. Information regarding licensees providing clinical care in DC reflects a subset of Board-licensed providers who 1. applied for license renewal during the 2024 cycle (i.e., were administered the survey); 2. reported a practice location in DC; and 3. reported providing clinical medical care to patients.

Key Findings

- Licensed registered nurses providing care in DC are ninety percent female and approximately ten percent are male.
- There is representation in each racial and ethnic group amongst registered nurses. However, there is an under-representation of almost seven percent for those that are Hispanic or Latino.
- Two-thirds of licensed registered nurses providing clinical care in DC are between the ages of 31 50 years of age.
- Almost fifty percent of licensed registered nurses providing clinical care in DC reported experiencing no symptoms of burn out.
- Sixty-four percent of licensed registered nurses providing clinical care in DC reported having a supportive work environment, but many reported challenges with their work pace and EMR stress. Organizational improvement in work pace and EMR stress may improve workforce wellness.











Age Distribution







The racial/ethnic distribution of licensed registered nurses practicing in the District of Columbia are nearly equal or better then the geographic representation for the District, in all five racial categories. However, there is under-representation amongst Hispanic or Latino(-4.98%) registered nurses.

Percentage of Licensed Registered Nurses Practicing in DC at Multiple Practice Locations





of licensed registered nurses practicing in the District reported Mini Z 2.0 full scale scores of 40+, indicating a **joyful workplace**.


*The licensure survey includes the Mini Z 2.0, a 10-question tool assessing work satisfaction, stress, burnout, and 7 potential drivers of burnout in practicing clinicians; the Mini Z 2.0 is a psychometrically sound measure of worklife and wellness in practicing clinicians, validated externally against the Maslach Burnout Inventory (MBI).

**Answering each question was optional; full scale scores are reported only for respondents who completed all Mini Z 2.0 questions; approximately 78.3 percent (7,274/9,287) of licensed registered nurses practicing in DC completed all questions on the Mini Z 2.0 survey.

76.6% of licensed registered nurses practicing DC reported experiencing no symptoms of burnout (44.42%) or some stress but not feeling burned out (32.22%).




