DC BOARD OF DENTISTRY LICENSED DENTAL ASSISTANTS

The District of Columbia's Board of Dentistry (DC BOD), supported by DC Health's Health Systems and Preparedness Administration (HSPA), licenses all dental assistants. To collect standard information across all licensing boards (e.g. demographics, workforce capacity, access to care, special topics) HSPA and the Community Health Administration (CHA) partnered to develop a licensure survey, which is now administered to all renewal applicants during the Board's biennial licensure renewal process.

The DC Primary Care Office (PCO) developed this fact sheet based on analysis of 2023 DC BOD Licensure Survey data. Within, information regarding *total licensed providers* reflects all board-licensed providers with an active license status as of March 19, 2024. Information regarding licensees providing clinical care in DC reflects a subset of Board-licensed providers who 1. applied for license renewal during the 2023 cycle (i.e., were administered the survey); 2. reported a practice location in DC; and 3. reported providing clinical medical care to patients.

Key Findings

- Most licensed dental assistants practicing clinical care in the District are Hispanic/Latino or Black/African American (78.8%).
- Around seventy eight percent of dental assistants report enjoying their work with no symptoms of burnout which is the highest percentage reported on that wellness question among the dental professions.








Total Licensed Dental Assistants by Clinical Care Status and Location



State of Residence Compared to Status of Providing Clinical Care in DC




Status of Providing Clinical Care in DC by State of Residence











Percentage of Licensed Dental Assistants Practicing in DC with Multiple Practice Locations












Self-Assessment of Worklife and Wellness among Licensed Dental Assistants Practicing in DC (Mini Z 2.0 Survey - Subscale Scores)
