From the 2017 District of Columbia Oral Health Surveillance System (DC OHSS)



1355 dentists have active licenses in DC. 736 dentists report practicing in DC.

542 dental hygienists and 641 dental assistants have active licenses in DC.

68.3% of the dentists report not currently accepting DC Medicaid, but 26.1% of these dentists report they plan to in the future.

30.5% of the dentists report treating individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities

Among the 736 Dentists Who Practice Full or Part-Time in DC,



plan to reduce patient hours



12.1% plan to increase patient hours



1.9% plan to move clinical practice out of DC



4.5% plan to move clinical practice within/into DC



plan to shift time to non-clinical activities



plan to hire additional dentists or hygienists





6 of 8 Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC) at **26** locations provide dental services in DC.




On average, about **22%** of FQHC patients visited the FQHC's dental clinic in 2015.
